THE PASSING OF JOHN WORTHINGTON

Retired S/Sgt. John Worthington, Regimental #21011, passed away on January 18, 2015 in Regina.

John was born at Timmins, Ontario and raised on a farm at Oakville, Ontario. After finishing high school, he joined the RCMP on July 16, 1959 in Toronto, Ontario and was posted to "N" Division in Ottawa, Ontario for basic training. Upon graduation in May of 1960, he was posted to the Regimental Band of the RCMP in Ottawa. In September of 1964 he was transferred to North Battleford, SK, to General Police Duties. Later in December of 1964 he was transferred to Lloydminster, SK, onto City Detachment, then to Rural Detachment and Highway Patrol.

He married Judy in June of 1965. In June of 1969 he was transferred to Cumberland House Detachment where he was the N.C.O. in charge. In June of 1971, John was transferred to Regina, SK to the Migratory Bird and Small Vessel Regulations Section. In April 1973 he was transferred to the Customs and Excise Section. In May of 1976 he was transferred to Regina GIS and

promoted to the rank of Sgt. In July 1978 he was promoted to the rank of S/Sgt. and transferred to "F" Division Headquarters, as the Assistant Security Coordinator for the upcoming Royal Visit. He was then transferred to the

Tabulation of Individual Responses to Survey

Rating points have been assigned the various options. The higher the number, the more desirable is the option. Each of the scores were out of 8.0.

SCORE	QUESTION
7.1	Promote more use of electronic delivery (email) of the <i>Friends</i> newsletter, <i>The Friendly Notes</i> . (Currently only about 12% receive the newsletter electronically.)
5.7	Reduce the annual number of issues of the newsletter from quarterly to three times a year.
4.5	Combine the <i>Friends</i> newsletter with the newsletter of the RCMP Heritage Centre with possibly reducing the content of the <i>Friends</i> newsletter to such things as listing new members including new life members, and leave upcoming events and new exhibits to the Heritage Centre portion. (Currently the distribution of the Heritage Centre's newsletter is primarily done electronically.)
3.90	Raise membership fees to cover these higher postage costs with possibly separate fees for: 1) domestic (within Canada), 2) continental USA, and 3) International.
1.95	Eliminate the newsletter entirely and have information about <i>Friends</i> activities, etc. only available online through the <i>Friends</i> website.

The *Friends* Board will discuss the significance of the noted scores and the path to take with future issues of the Newsletter.

RE-ENACTMENT OF THE MARCH WEST MAY 8 To July 24, 1999

The following was edited by Murray Klatt from reports that were published for the reading pleasure of the rank and file members of the RCMP during the re-enactment.

1998 was the 125th Anniversary of the North West Mounted Police. The March West, however never really got going until 1874. The first year of existence saw the newly recruited members of the NWMP travel to Fort Dufferin, now known as Emerson, Manitoba. The winter was taken up training for the life and unknowns which the Force was about to experience. To commemorate the 125th Anniversary a decision was made to re-enact the March West with current members. Veterans and members of the public volunteering to participate. The March was divided into 2 parts. A South Route which was to travel from Emerson, Manitoba, beginning on March 8th, 1999 and arriving at Fort MacLeod, Alberta on 3rd of July, 1999. The North Route is not part of this story.

As with the original March West, there existed a sense of urgency. The creation of the NWMP was made necessary by the problems that whiskey traders had created with the First Nations residents living on the Western Prairies. The re-enactment, although not having the same "need" as the original, was begun a month earlier than was originally planned, so that it could arrive in Calgary for the first day of the 1999 Calgary Stampede. The earlier date, in 1999, resulted in the March encountering very wet weather until it entered Saskatchewan on the 21st of March. "...only 1 day of sunshine and 2 days without rain in the first 14."

The South Route was broken down into 9 blocks of 4 to 8 days each. The first 2 blocks saw the March travel from Emerson, Manitoba to the Manitoba/Saskatchewan border West of Pierson, Manitoba. The next 5 blocks crossed the Province of Saskatchewan and the last 3 blocks travelled

from the Saskatchewan/Alberta border west of Fort Walsh, to Fort Macleod. To break it down further, the March crossed Manitoba in 15 days, Saskatchewan in 28 days and Alberta in 13 days.

The participants were encouraged to apply for a full block but some were allowed to participate for a few as 3 days. Unlike the original ride, a support crew, composed of Department of National Defence personnel and volunteers, took down the camp each morning and moved it to the next stop. A number of communities along the way organized special events in which the members of the March could participate. Sgt. Rick Wychreschuk and Cpl. Doug Coleman of "F" Division Community Services Section, prepared daily reports on the progress of the South Route ride as it crossed Province of Saskatchewan. Volunteer Bob Cocks, Regina RCMP Veteran, Summer Student Rob Taylor, CEO Al Nicholson and Sergent Major Yvon Mercier worked tirelessly planning and organizing the full event. The Force

commissioned a painting of the Original March West and prints were framed and presented to the various communities through which the March passed.

Communities through which the South Route March passed, included: Emerson, Gretna, Reinland, Winkler, Morden, Pembina Crossing, Crystal City, Cartwright, Killarney, Deloraine, Medora, Melita, Pierson, Manitoba; Carnduff, Oxbow, Ray's Park, Roche Percee, Estevan, Torquay, Tribune, Radville, Ceylon, Pangman, Perry, Avonlea, Spring Valley, Mossbank. Gravelbourg, Glen Bain, Pambrun, Lac Pelletier, Simmie, Carmichael, Piapot, Maple Creek, Fort Walsh, Saskatchewan; and Elk-water, Manberries, Etziom, Foremost, Rattlesnake Reservoir, Bow Island, County 40 Mile Park, Les O'Hara's, Writing on Stone Provincial Park, Coffin Bridge, Whoop-Up Trail, Conrad's, Raymond, Lethbridge, Calgary, and Fort Macleod in Alberta.

The opening ceremony which was held at Fort Dufferin on May 8, 1999, and was attended by a number of political dignitaries, local citizens, serving members and Veterans of the RCMP. The Commissioner Phil Murray, Assistant Commissioner Tom Eggelstone, Commanding Officer of Manitoba and Assistant Commissioner Harper Boucher, Commanding Officer of Saskatchewan were all amongst the first riding contingent. To start the March, a small cannon was fired and Commissioner Murray's horse bolted. After a frenzied quarter mile ride, Commissioner Murray got control of his horse and was able to return and take his place in the ride. This incident prompted C/Supt. Daryl McFadyen to comment, "We had problems with our horses in the first March West and it looks like we are going to have trouble this time also!"

In researching this project it was learned that National monies which had been obtained for this event were part of what was dubbed the "Sponsorship Scandal." After the end of the March, all the official reports and photographs were packaged up and sent to RCMP HQ in Ottawa. The original participants have never seen their work since that time, however, no irregularities or improprieties were found in the use of these monies.

The following excerpts were taken from the Reports that were compiled by Sgt. Wychreschuk and Cpl. Doug Coleman for the South Route, while the March wound its way across Saskatchewan.

Friday, May 21 – "Rain clouds looming and threatening to open up, the March West team commenced departing Regina at 0900 hrs. Five trucks, loaded with what we believed included all that was need to set up Camp Gainsborough. The clouds opened up and we encountered heavy rain into early evening. At Carnduff, the rain stopped about 2200 hrs."


