

Hi Roger, You will be pleased to learn that we have one possible identification of the Uniform member in your photograph. Jack Foster, a Vet from Nanaimo B.C. who was stationed in Saskatchewan, believes the member is Ken Ross. We checked our records and find that a Kenneth Gordon Ross, S/Sgt. was stationed in the North Battlefor area and died on June 13th., 2001, and was buried at North Battleford in Woodlawn Memorial Gardens Cemetary. He was Reg. #14927 and joined the Force on June 10th. 1947.

I trust this is the information you required for your personal records.

FOR ACTS OF GREAT BRAVERY AND GALLANT CONDUCT

To those of us in the RCMP in the years following a sensational bank robbery and shoot-out, he was known as "Bullets" Johnstone. I had the pleasure of meeting him when he eventually became the Saskatchewan "F" Division Personnel Officer, and heard him tell his version of the shoot-out first hand. The following story was published in a 1973 Star Weekly Magazine, to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the RCMP and its predecessors. A description and brief history of the George Medal produced by Wikipedia is attached.

There are heroes and there are *heroes*. Inspector Bud Johnstone is a *hero*. His act of courage took place back in April of 1956 when the inspector was a constable, but it must be included in any review of heroics.

Johnstone was in the first RCMP car to answer a call that the Royal Bank in Coquitlam, B.C. was being held up. At the bank, Johnstone leaped from the still moving car; his partner drove on to the parking lot.

Inside, everything appeared calm. Manager J.D. Howat was standing behind the counter, looking nervous. Johnstone asked if everything was all right. As the manager was shaking his head, no, the first bullet hit Johnstone. It was fired by a masked bandit named Herbert Howerton who had been hiding behind the counter. The bullet was .38 calibre, fired at close range, and it knocked Johnstone sprawling to the floor. Suddenly, a second masked bandit appeared from the vault. That bandit, Howard Folster, panicked. The wounded Mountie was between him and the front door. Then a third bandit, William Banks, appeared from the manager's office. Picture the scene. Johnstone sprawled on the floor, surrounded by three desperate bandits, one armed with a .38,

the second with a .32 and Banks with a shotgun. What to do?

Well! By this time Johnstone had his .38 Special out. He whipped off a fast shot, wisely choosing the bandit with the shotgun first. The shot hit Banks in the left shoulder, spinning him around and making him drop the shotgun. One down.

The second bandit, Folster, was by this time hysterical. Screaming in fright, he charged Johnstone, emptying five shots from his .32. *All* the shots hit Johnstone. His empty gun clicking, Folster made it through the door and tried to jump aboard the getaway truck. The truck was moving too fast and Folster fell off, collapsing in blind, weeping terror on the ground. Two down.

Howerton, the bandit whose first shot had felled Johnstone, then leaped the counter, clutching his .38 and \$10,000 in cash. He, too, had to get past Johnstone to the only exit. Firing wildly, he charged and again Johnstone, with uncanny accuracy, fired a shot that ripped through the bandit's left arm, spinning him through the doors into the line of fire of Johnstone's partner, who had been outside covering Banks and the frightened Folster. Johnstone was hit two more times but, incredibly, he staggered to his feet and with his partner chased Howerton down the street. Within 15 feet, Howerton fell, shot cleanly through the heart.

When help arrived, Johnstone was sitting on the sidewalk, eight bullet wounds in his body, covering the dead bandit and the wounded Banks and Folster with his empty gun. Johnstone's partner was aiding in the hunt for the fourth bandit in the getaway truck.

Johnstone had been shot in the left little finger, left palm, left shoulder, right chest, right side,

right forearm and left hip. The bullet in his chest had been deflected off course from his heart by a button on his tunic

The whole tragic shootout was over in a matter of minutes. The fourth bandit was caught shortly afterwards. Johnstone recovered in hospital in a week and was awarded the George Medal for great bravery.

* * *

The George Medal (GM) is the second level civil decoration of the United Kingdom and Commonwealth. The GM was instituted on 24 September 1940 by King George VI. The medal is presented to those performing acts of bravery in, or meriting recognition by, the United Kingdom.

Announcing the new award, the King said:

In order that they should be worthily and promptly recognised, I have decided to create, at once, a new mark of honour for men and women in all walks of civilian life. I propose to give my name to this new distinction, which will consist of the George Cross, which will rank next to the Victoria Cross, and the George Medal for wider distribution.

The GM is a circular silver medal. The obverse depicts the crowned effigy of the reigning monarch. The reverse shows St. George on horseback slaying the dragon on the coast of England, with the legend THE GEORGE MEDAL around the top edge of the medal. The ribbon is 32mm, crimson with five narrow blue stripes. The blue colour is taken from the George Cross ribbon.

The "Depot" Division Recruit (now Cadet) Band was formed in 1963 to provide marching music for the Sergeant Major's Parade and Sunset Ceremonies As each troop starts training, a request for three volunteer cadets is made to join the band. The new band members are trained by senior troop band members and are quickly placed on parade. Over the years, RCMP bands have come and gone, but the RCMP Cadet Band endures, playing at every Sergeant Major's parade and Sunset Ceremony held at "Depot". At present, there are also seven RCMP volunteer pipe bands across Canada, comprised of both RCMP and community members. The pipe bands are located in Halifax, Montreal, Ottawa, Regina, Edmonton, and Vancouver. In addition to playing for police functions, these bands participate in parades, concerts and other events in their regions, proudly wearing the RCMP tartan kilt and world famous red serge tunic as their dress uniform. Bob resumed work as the Officer in Charge of the Cadet Training Program and then became the Depot Training Officer, following which he was promoted to Chief Superintendent in 2006 until retirement in 2010.

Bob and his wife Debbie have three children all of whom reside in Regina.
