Hello Friends of the RCMP Heritage Centre,

I am writing to ask a favour. The attached photographs are of a hunting knife that is a prized possession of an elderly man. He has had the knife since he was a small boy (mid 1930's) on a farm in Northern Alberta. He does not recall how it came to him but recalls that his grandfather operated a small rural post office for several years at or near the farm in the North Bank area of Alberta and he recalls a Member of the RCMP patrolling through their area in uniform via horseback. He wondered if the knife's origin might have been one of the patrolling Members.

He is curious to learn if this knife or one similar to it would have any historical connection with the Force. I indicated to him that I suspected that it was a souvenir type of item and that it was unlikely to have been part of official equipment issued to Members during or before that era but that I would contact the Heritage Centre to determine if they can offer any information about this or similar knives.

Your assistance and any information that you can offer would be much appreciated.

It is fitting that such a memorable day should evoke fond memories on this sweet June 2011 day twelve years later. So compelling are the memories that I have chosen to share them with you. My adventure was originally published in a three part section of the 1999 Saskatchewan Horse Federation Issues of "Showtrail".

The following is the second of a three part series.



'CHESTER' JOINS THE FORCE

I knew that with the keen interest and popularity of this adventure, good horses would soon become hard to find. Our youngest daughter, Tricia, has a big grey Tennessee walking horse, out at Kelowna, but that's too far away to be practical. But I'm lucky, I have a couple of farmer friends with spares, who are genuinely accommodating.

Now, selecting a horse is similar to buying a used car, you have to try it out first to make sure everything works. Then there is equipment. I still have a couple of saddles down at the farm that are badly in need of a clean-up. A visit to Claypool Saddlery yields the latest in liquid saddle-soap, along with a couple of reinforcement straps. After a couple hours of soap and elbow grease, the old leather is shining and pliable, fit for any self-respecting cowboy. For good measure, I give the boots a going over too.

My farm neighbour, Milo, has three mounts to choose from. Misty, the apaloosa, is a little heavy and slow, Sundance the chestnut is inclined to be lazy, and Chester, the chestnut, is an eight-year old gelding and hasn't been ridden for two years. He's good-lookin and independent, staying aloof from the others. "He's got stamina", Milo declared, "Will still be going

when the others have played out." Could be just what I need on a twenty-five mile a day trek. "Chester, eh, brings to mind the side-kick of Matt Dillon", I say, "Hope he doesn't develop a limp after a couple miles."

Chester coaxes in with a little oats, accepts the halter and I spend a good hour combing and brushing great swatches of winter hair and burrs. After grooming, I introduce him to the saddle which he gingerly accepts, then I lead him around to get re-used to it. He's settling down well so I hand Milo the halter-shank while I mount up, just to see how he reacts. I gingerly put a toe in the stirrup, then up and on....so far so good. Then Milo decides to walk him around the yard, and the next thing I know he is headed down the driveway out to the road. I'm already saying a prayer of thanks that Milo's wife and daughters are away for the day, now all I need is for one of the neighbours to drive by and spot old Q. C. being led around like a kid on a circus pony!

I dismounted faster than the time in training when a jackrabbit scared my horse and she dumped me in a snowbank. The next morning, after a good ride, we decided to transfer Chester to the Community pasture for conditioning and solo training.

The pasture was an ideal area to ride, with hills and ravines, buck-brush, creeks and dams. The first early morning ride the air was filled with meadow-lark songs and the scent of pink crocuses and yellow cowslips. On arrival at a shallow creek, Chester came to a sudden stop. When I urged him forward, he would step into the water, then swing quickly away to the left or right. After a few circles and re-approach, I knew that the time had arrived to determine who was in charge. I respected him for having a mind of his own — a good quality in a working mount. But if I relented now, I may as well get off and carry HIM across the creek!

It was time to get firm, so I walked him back to the waters edge, halted and held there for thirty seconds.... then gathering the reins firmly, I leaned forward and whispered in his cocked ears, "Chester, I was in the Mounties and I still have my shiny solid nickel spurs. I don't want to wear them, but if I have to, I will".

Well, you probably guessed the rest of the story — Chester not only splashed through that creek like a duck, but from then on went out of his way to get his feet wet.

On the week-end of May 8th 1999, when the trek began at Emerson Manitoba, I had volunteered to assist Milo on his annual cattle drive to summer pasture. The

weather had turned stormy with snow and rain across the prairies. It was reminiscent of the first days of the original trek in 1884. Maybe waiting until June 5th to start at Avonlea, was a bit of luck.

The photo below is of Chester, while getting his new shoes put on. A few minutes later he knocked over his tool stand, dumping nails and shoes into the dirt. (expletives deleted) Boys will be boys, but when June 5th. 99 rolls around we'll be ready, so don't worry, neighbour.

MAKING MUSIC FROM FLOOR BOARDS - THE "ST. ROCH" VIOLIN

After a visit to the RCMP Historical Collections Unit in July this year, ex-S/Sgt. Fred Bodnaruk, RCMP (Retired) (Reg. No.17117) donated a very unique piece to the collection – a violin made of wood from the RCMP Schooner "St. Roch". The story of the "St. Roch" should be known by one and all – and so no need to retell it here – but the story of the violin might be of some interest.

Who better to tell it than Fred Bodnaruk himself:

"Upon the vessel's return to Vancouver, BC, it was tendered for refit, allowing various physical changes to the deck and super structure and then being returned to service. The Sterling Ship Yard Ltd., of Vancouver attained the refit contract. Subsequently a crew of specialists undertook this task, one being Freeman (Robert) Cornish, now ninety-four years young. I am proud to be his neighbor.

"Cornish stated that he and the crew first altered the deck by ripping out windows, door frames and stair treads. All were made of fine quality teak wood imported from either Australia or Burma. He believes it to be from Burma, since it is of oily and dense quality. Unbelievably all this fine wood was destined for the burner at a nearby dump. The foreman announces that if anyone wanted to grab a piece of the 'St. Roch', now was the time. Cornish, being a good carpenter and handyman, rescued several pieces of door jamb. He had in mind a future coffee table, however his plan did not materialize. This wood remained in his basement until the year 2007. One day he said to me 'you are making violins, why don't you make one out of this wood and even if it does not play well, it will commemorate the 'St. Roch'. Excitedly I took up his offer.

"On initial examination, I noted this wood to possess a fine tap tone, a first consideration towards instrument making. Within a period of three months, I crafted five violin back plates from this teak wood. I was truly amazed at its tone, since teak wood is not desirable to most violin makers. To date, the instruments I made from this wood were played by several fine violinists, all were surprised at the tonal quality, declaring them as Above Average."

To accompany the violin, Fred also built a small table again using pieces from the "St. Roch" to build the frame and the decorative features of the anchor and chain. The globe that completes the set is made of cedar wood with a veneer taken from the "St. Roch" and formed into the North American Continent. It is an honour to add this unique piece to our collections in memory of that heroic little schooner.
