### THE SHERWOOD CUP



On the first of February 1920, the Dominion Police Force was absorbed into the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The small force had been organized in 1868 to protect the Parliament Buildings in the dark days following the assassination of Thomas D'Arcy McGee. But the Force branched out in the years that followed: Dominion Police officers served as bodyguards to government leaders, they served as intelligence agents infiltrating the Fenian Brotherhood in the 1860s and, as the British withdrew in 1911, the Dominion Police Force took over protection of the naval dockyards at Halifax and Esquimalt. The small Force was responsible for the national fingerprint bureau, the parole service, the enforcement of laws relating to counterfeiting and during the First World War, it fell to the Dominion Police Force to enforce the War Measures Act. In 2011, the Dominion Police Force reappeared at the RCMP Historical Collections Unit with the donation of the Sherwood Cup to the collection. A beautiful silver Loving Cup made by Birks of Canada, the Sherwood Cup was presented to the Chief Commissioner of Police within Canada, Lieutenant-Colonel Sir Arthur Percy Sherwood, on his retirement in June 1919 by the members of the Dominion Police Force. It is an outstanding reminder of the esteem in which Sherwood was held.

Arthur Percy Sherwood was born in Bytown in 1854. He began his career in police work in 1877 when he was appointed Deputy Sheriff of Carleton County. From April 1879 to October 1882, he served as Chief of Police in Ottawa, the second man to fill the position. In 1882, he was appointed Superintendent of the Dominion Police Force and quickly rose through the ranks as he was promoted Commissioner in 1885 and then Chief Commissioner in 1913.

Sherwood had an equally rapid rise through the ranks of Canada's militia. He became a Lieutenant in The Guards in 1884. In 1886, he was transferred to the 43rd Regiment as Captain. With the 43rd Regiment, Sherwood rose to the rank of Major in 1889 then to Lieutenant Colonel and Commanding Officer from 1898 to 1904. In 1930, Sherwood was named Honorary Colonel of the 38th Cameron Highlanders.

Lieutenant-Colonel Sir Arthur Percy Sherwood died on 15 October 1940. The Ottawa Citizen wrote: "If the real test of the fineness of a man's character can be gauged by the number of friends who sincerely mourn his passing then Sir Percy was one of the finest. Throughout his long, active and highly honourable life he made friends everywhere. He was in fact one of those fortunate individuals who look out rather than in, whose mind was not so much concerned with his own interests that he could find no time to delight in other people's happiness or to sympathize with their sorrows.

"This emanation of essential kindliness and consideration for others made Sir Percy a

welcome figure in every walk of life in which he moved; there was not a constable or officer of the Dominion Police of which for so long he was the honoured head, but looked on him as a friend, but had for him a sense of keen personal loyalty, a loyalty which is the bed-rock basis of efficiency in every organization; not an officer in the old 43rd, or in any of the messes of later units but eagerly welcomed his coming to their company..." (Editorial, The Ottawa Citizen)

This unique piece of Canada's early federal police history will be going on exhibition at the RCMP Heritage Centre in the New Year as part of the HCU's "New Acquisitions" display. The Sherwood Cup will be displayed with other memorabilia belonging to Sir Percy Sherwood. We hope you'll have a chance to drop in to see the exhibit.

# BANFF INDIAN DAYS AND RODEO

The following article on the colourful history of the Banff Indian Days and Rodeo was submitted by RCMP Veteran Regimental #18648, Alex Matches of Surrey, B.C. He also supplied several photos of the Banff Parade in July 1958 and one of the Indian participants. Editor

The Banff Indian Days and Rodeo was a tradition that began in 1889 by the Banff Springs Hotel and was held annually until 1978.

After two years on the Musical Ride in 1956 and 1957, I turned down going on the 1958 Ride and returned to duty in Calgary. In the spring of 1958, I was informed that I was going to Banff Detachment for the summer. My past years and experience as a horseman were likely the reason for my posting. I couldn't seem to get away from red serge and horses in my five years of service. Even while in training, our troop was called upon to escort dignitaries and diplomats and to escort the Governor-General to the 1955 Opening of Parliament. Then following training, I spent a summer in "A" Division in red

serge on Parliament Hill, Rideau Hall, The Mint and other Protective Branch locations around Ottawa.


I reported to Banff on July 1St as a summer addition with one other member from Calgary detachment. After a very busy couple of weeks I was told that I would be taking part in the Indian Days Parade and Rodeo weekend with Staff Sergeant R.C. Gray, N.C.O. i/c Calgary Sub-Division.

With tack and saddlery sent from Regina (or Rockcliffe ?) and two local horses, Eagle and Rowe, Staff Gray and I led the parade from the Indian Days grounds, through town, first to the Park Administration Building then to the courtyard of the Banff Springs Hotel for the viewing pleasure of the many tourists gathered there. The two horses performed beautifully and seemed to sense that they were representing the force. After the parade duties were over I was on mounted patrol on the grounds during each of my day shifts.

That summer in Banff continued to be a busy one. Near the end of July, Princess Margaret stopped in Banff en route to British Columbia for that province's centennial year celebrations. During her four-day stay at Fairholm Ranch, outside of town, dozens of members were brought in for her security and part of that security included a mounted contingent. Six horses were borrowed from Brewster's Stables and a number of men were transferred in from around the province to make up the mounted section which patrolled the grounds of the ranch. Many of these men were ex-Musical Ride members, including Corporal Bob Simmonds, later commissioner, who was on the 1953 Queen's Coronation ride.

The month of August was a bit quieter but with lots of interesting police work, then toward the end of the month Staff Gray and I were on mounted duty again. The Coca-Cola Company in Toronto was filming an international commercial film which





was to depict typical scenes from countries around the world, e.g., Dutch windmills, the pyramids, Eiffel Tower, Mount Rushmore, etc. Of course, what would be more Canadian than red-coated mounted policemen. Staff Gray and I were "on location" with a film crew for two days at the nearby Hoodoos, with snow-capped Rocky Mountains in the background. The next day was spent filming at Banff's famous Bow Falls which at that time was pictured on the reverse of the five dollar bill.

Toward the end of September when the Banff Springs Hotel was preparing to close down for the winter, which it did in those days, I was returned to Calgary. A week later I was transferred to Okotoks, a two-man detachment south of Calgary from where I took my discharge, "time expired" in June, 1959.

In 2004, while on a trailer trip through Alberta with my wife and granddaughter, we were in the Banff Springs Hotel courtyard where we found a statue of a mounted policeman, which was a tribute to "The North West Mounted Police," by sculptor Harry 0' Hanlan (1916-1996). It was the same courtyard that we had escorted the Indian Days Parade to in 1958. To my granddaughter, that mounted policeman's statue will forever be of me.
